PASTOR'S REFLECTION

SANCTUARY REFURBISHING PROJECT

We will soon start a long overdue project to refurbish our sanctuary. We have not been able to undertake this project due to leaks in our sanctuary roof in various locations over the last twenty plus years. The entire roof over the original building was replaced one year ago and we have had no signs of leaks in the sanctuary since that time. If you look up into the sanctuary you will see plaster peeling in various spots, tape hanging from the ceiling, numerous black spots and other imperfections. Once you look up and identify these spots you will find yourself looking up and continuing to find additional spots that need addressed. As a result, our council has approved the following projects to address the needs of the sanctuary.

A qualified painter has been contracted to repair all water damaged areas, refurbish wood window sills, clean and polish wood beams, and all other wood areas. In addition, they will place light filtering on the high windows in the back of the sanctuary to replace blinds that currently do not work. Electricians will replace all lights in the sanctuary with new LED energy efficient lightning, and the four ceiling fans will be replaced. The carpet will be replaced in the chancel area and also the narthex. The narthex carpet will be the last step in bringing the project to conclusion.

The sanctuary project will begin the Wednesday after Easter and include enlisting help to clear out chairs, banners, electronics, and anything else easily moveable. Please consider signing up to help as you are available.

We will be using the community center for Sunday services beginning Sunday, April 16 and the plan is to return to the sanctuary by the end of May if all goes as scheduled. Keep in mind we will not know the full scope of the project until the work is under way. Pastor and staff are working diligently to create some exciting worship opportunities in the community center. We will continue to live stream our worship service every Sunday.

We are blessed to have the funds to be able to take on this project. God has blessed our congregation and we look forward to the years ahead as we worship in our updated sanctuary and continue to do God's work. We will keep you updated on a weekly basis.
